Superintendent's Message

Doubling Down on Workforce Readiness

Arguably the single most important outcome of preK-12 education is being prepared for the world of work in adult life.

Whether that transition happens immediately upon graduation or after entering an apprenticeship or trade program, takes place within or after service in the U.S. Military, or is subsequent to earning a 2- or 4-year college degree, a person's success is largely predicated upon the foundation provided by their educational experience up to and including high school graduation.

Over the last decade in the Hillsboro School District, we have been very intentional about developing the infrastructure necessary to ensure students are aware, eligible, and prepared for opportunities after they graduate. Our Career and College Pathways (CCP) program is one of the best in the state and region, and we are often consulted by other districts looking to replicate our structure and partnership model. The strong programs and partnerships that exist between the City of Hillsboro, Hillsboro

School District, and local industry partners and community-based organizations are a primary reason that Oregon's Governor Kate Brown chose Hillsboro as the location for the ceremonial signing of Senate Bill 1545, known as the Future Ready Oregon Bill.

According to the Governor's office, Future Ready Oregon is a comprehensive \$200 million investment that will give Oregonians the education, training, and resources they need to

land good-paying careers in key industries across the state. Crafted with input from Governor's the Racial **Justice** Council. the package focuses on opportunities historically underserved communities,

adult including

learners, dislocated workers, people of color, women, people with low incomes, rural communities, and disconnected youth. Future Ready Oregon was passed with bipartisan support from a vast coalition of diverse stakeholders working alongside the Governor's Office and Oregon's Racial Justice Council.

HSD Assistant Superintendent Travis Reiman and Dual Credit and Career & College Pathways Teacher on Special Assignment Melissa Pendergrass were invited to the event to represent the District on behalf of all staff whose previous and ongoing work have elevated our programs to where they are today.

Through data-driven analysis of high wage, high demand jobs in the greater Hillsboro community and beyond, as well as student interest surveys, the District continues to evolve and add programming that will prepare students for their next steps after high school. We look forward to strengthening these programs and ensuring our students have every advantage possible upon graduation.

Budget Matters: Pandemic Recovery Funds

Over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, the federal government has HSD's allocations are as follows: made support and recovery funds available to individuals, nonprofits, businesses, municipalities, and school districts.

School district support has come through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund, established as part of the Education Stabilization Fund in the CARES Act. There have been three rounds of ESSER funding made available to school districts as reimbursements for eligible expenses up to the allocation amount, which is based upon the formula used to determine a district's Title IA distribution under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA).

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Student Achievement Spotlight

Science Ambassadors Club

This spring, thirty-eight students from Rachelle Carnes' Health Sciences II class at Century High School are serving as Science Ambassadors and sharing important health and science information with elementary school students in an age-appropriate, engaging after-school club.

Led by seniors Tiffanie Tran, Henry Duong, and seven other directors, the Ambassadors' goal is to raise awareness about science and health with students at a young age so they can be more informed about what's happening in their bodies, and to provide insight for possible courses of study and career paths available to them in the future.

Sponsored by OHSU at the Oregon Regional Primate Research Center, Science Ambassadors is a program that has been in Beaverton for several years and was offered to Hillsboro in 2020-21.

In its pilot year, Century's Science Ambassadors Club took place at Ladd Acres Elementary School and was so well received that the students expanded it to Imlay Elementary School in 2021-22. The target audience is fifth graders, and there were 12 students participating at Ladd and 6 students participating at Imlay. The program ran on six Monday afternoons between February and March.

Century High School Health Sciences students serve Science Ambassadors.

The day I visited Imlay's program - Monday, Feb. 28 - the topic was the brain. There were nine Ambassadors present, and two were in charge of the presentation. The others were there to observe and assist the students with the hands-on portions of the class. which started out with introductions and an icebreaker game of Memory played in teams. The presenters then started their slideshow and began explaining the purpose and function of different parts of the brain.

To help make the presentation more interactive and memorable, each elementary student was given a white hard hat and access to multi-colored markers. They used the markers to outline and label the parts of the brain on the hat.

> By the end of their program, elementary students will have learned about nutrition, the skeletal system, the brain, cells, DNA, and the heart. Ambassadors developed the lessons based on what they learned on the topics in Anatomy & Physiology and Health Sciences II.

"This project has put our seniors into the driver's seat and

allowed them to grow in a leadership role," explains Century Health Sciences teacher Rachelle Carnes. "The students do it all. I am just there to make suggestions and copies. This has been an amazing program for the students to have access to during COVID, as it gets them working with others and extending past their basic academics. For the last two years, we haven't been able to send students into internships or experiential learning opportunities, so Science Ambassadors has been a great substitute."

The students make all the contacts with the partner schools and take care of the marketing and outreach to families. For some, this is the first time they've had to have that type of formal communication with adults, but students have embraced the responsibility.

"It's like a real job as opposed to a project," remarked one Ambassador.

It also helps solidify the Ambassadors' own knowledge on the topics at hand, as there is a certain degree of learning reciprocity with the near-peer teaching model: "in preparing the lessons we need to be sure we have a firm grasp of the material," explains another Ambassador. "They [elementary students] may not fully understand everything we're teaching them, but it's important for them to know how to better care for themselves. It's also refreshing to see kids happy to learn."

Classmate Isabella Godoy highlights another benefit of becoming more aware and savvy when it comes to healthcare topics: "Growing up, I had to translate a lot for my parents. And just knowing the basic concepts of the medical system and how to navigate it has been really helpful. I now understand how the current system can sometimes fail people and how I can make it better."

Carnes shares that OHSU might be looking to expand the Science Ambassadors program to other schools in HSD and we would welcome the opportunity.



Spring is wonderful time at R.A. Brown. Students are busily growing both academically and socially. However, one of the most anticipatory spring moments is the seasonal march of the ducklings. Butternut Creek Elementary School

In collaboration with our Parent Teacher Club and a Century High School Senior, this spring we will be painting a community mural with

an Oregon landscape theme in our undercover area to beautify our campus. Student artwork will be incorporated into the design and every student will be able to paint a portion of the mural.



Our Chess Club is going strong. We have 55 students participating. At the most recent tournament on March 19th, our team came in 1st place out of 28 teams! Seven Butternut students have been selected to attend the State Chess Tournament on April 8th.



We have partnered with Clean Water Services on a student design project to tell the story of Butternut Creek. Our classes went on walking field trips through the Butternut Creek wildlife area and submitted artwork that will be used on informational signage to inspire visitor curiosity and interest. Installation of the art will take place late spring/early summer.



Students at Imlay Elementary participated in an after school STEAM event! A variety of vendors were on site to provide education. Teachers created STEAM activities for students to rotate through. Some of the highlights were creating a stress relieving tool with rice and essential oils, building with a variety of materials, art projects, and more!

Indian Hills Elementary School



Hillsboro Schools Foundation awarded Indian Hills Elementary School a \$7,000 grant to build a dedicated makerspace lab. A makerspace is a room that contains tools and components, allowing one to enter with an idea and leave with a complete project. The best part is that makerspaces are communal and students - sometimes alongside staff, parents, and mentors - create; problem solve; and develop skills, talents, and mental rigor. By fall of 2022, this lab will allow students an after-school club as well as a space to come during the day to interact with science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM) materials.

Ladd Acres Elementary School



On Thursday, March 3, we had a Day of STEAM. The whole school participated in different STEAM activities throughout the day. Golden Road Arts, a community partner, also came to teach an engineering-integrated art lesson.





CCP Family Engagement

> Throughout the year, the Family Engagement Team provided a variety of virtual workshops such as Pathway To Scholarships with an emphasis on exposing students and their families to all post-secondary pathways. To end the year, the team plans on implementing their very first Juntos (meaning "together" in Spanish) Program cohort in collaboration with Oregon State University. The Juntos curriculum provides culturally relevant programming for 8-12th grade Latinx students and their parents to help them acquire the knowledge, skills, and resources to gain access to

Due to the modified service models of Comprehensive Distance Learning and Hybrid in the 2020-21 school year, the District did not access ESSER Funds last year. Instead, we have carried the funds forward and allocated them on an annual basis as part of the regular budget development cycle, mapped backwards from their expiration date and targeting both operational and student needs.

These funds are considered temporary in nature, and the District is intentionally targeting them to provide temporary supplemental



services for learning acceleration, safety and health, and stability in operations over the full length of time available.

The City of Hillsboro received more than \$18 million to assist with the community's COVID recovery and some of that money is being invested in collaborative partnerships with HSD like workforce development and after school programs. We are looking forward to upcoming events such as the Proud to be HSD Festival and graduations. Most importantly, we're looking forward to the plans our seniors are making as they move forward with what they have learned and experienced, and grow into the amazing adults they will become.

Helping students on their journey are our outstanding volunteers and donors.

Volunteers such as those organized by local business Just Create Community, who greet students at Eastwood Elementary School once a week as they arrive for school, have found creative ways to support our students even when our doors were closed to them. Their smiles and greetings (and awesome 'VIP' guest greeters) are priceless to our students, families, and staff. Barbara Finnie, a volunteer greeter from the very beginning, says that feeling is reciprocated. "Welcoming students as their school day began is one of my fondest memories. It was a great way to start my own day. What a privilege that was!" According to Cindy Cosenzo, owner of Just Create Community, her business adopted Eastwood Elementary School in 2017 aiming to "engage the local community with Eastwood students in a variety of fun ways that let the students know that the community cares about them and their education." This support includes Community Readers, teaching cursive to students, Virtual Community Readers, donation drives, and more, and they will soon add Community Pen Pals to the mix.

In February, we again celebrated National Engineering Week with Intel. More than 150 Intel volunteers visited 63 4th grade classrooms and over 1,500 students! Intel's

diverse group of real-life engineer volunteers promoted hands-on STEM learning with their creative project "Lunar Lander." Students used straws, paper, rubber bands, a cup, and

the 'design thinking' process to create a product that would help an astronaut (in this case, a lollipop) land safely on the moon. They then got to interact with their volunteer engineers, enabling them themselves visualize

in a STEM career. Blake Horner, Intel's Oregon Community Engagement Manager, said: "This effort is part of Intel's longtime commitment to support STEM pathways with students in our local communities, and we can't wait to do it all again next year." Our students echo that anticipation!

Read Across America was back this March! Our elementary schools welcomed volunteer readers from our own School Board, Hillsboro Fire & Rescue, North Plains Police Department, Washington County Sheriff's Office, and even the mayors of Hillsboro and North Plains. In fact, Mayor Callaway made a video so that all classes could have access to a guest reader, even if not in-person.

Our donors have been busy also! The Hillsboro Elks Lodge provided more than 400 new coats to our students, as well as over 500 holiday food and gift baskets to HSD families. Christmas for Kids supplied coats, hats, gloves, fleece blankets, and books to 160 elementary students. The Assistance League once again offered individual Fred Meyer clothing vouchers to students in grades K-12. Added up, these vouchers totaled more than \$100,000


2021's project list wraps up with completion of seismic work on Groner K-8's gym. As we enter the penultimate year of the bond, building of ES29 continues where phase 1 site work left off. So far, 27 other projects are slated for 2022,

including: replacement of single-paned windows at Groner K-8 and North Plains and West Union Elementary Schools; domestic water pipe replacements at Hare Field and McKinney Elementary; and a new bus dropoff at Tobias Elementary. Around the district, safety and security work focuses on remaining entry vestibules, security system upgrades, window security film, and fencing and gates. A highlight of this year will be the new photovoltaic solar array at Liberty High School, adding another learning tool to the school's

ES29 Building ConstructionPhase 2 is underway

At Hillsboro School District's newest elementary school, and the last major project

of the bond, site work in phase 1 started in summer 2021 and concluded in December. This included: preliminary grading of the site; constructing the base and fencing for the synthetic turf field; laying out, initial paving and concrete work for the dropoffs and parking lots; and perimeter concrete sidewalks.

In March 2022, phase 2 work began with further site grading and trenching for utility lines. Construction of the foundation started with framing and rebar installation for footings at the southeast corner of the building, and crews have started pouring concrete for these footings. More footings for the rest of the building will follow until the full concrete foundation slab is built, after which the structural steel can begin to be erected. Opening in fall 2023, the school can house up to 600 students in the 73,500 sq. ft., two-story building. Like the new Atfalati Ridge and Brookwood Elementary Schools before it, the building will be constructed to the latest "immediate occupancy" seismic code.

Special features will include a modern media center, centralized learning areas, a STEAM lab, and a glass-enclosed think tank for student group collaboration. Natural daylighting will stream throughout the building via clerestory windows. The gym and lighted, synthetic turf field will provide not only space for students' physical education, but also much-needed facilities for community youth recreation leagues. Unique to ES29, however, will be a rooftop solar array that will provide partial power to the building.

The school is located in south Hillsboro, at SE Kinnaman Road and SE Reed Drive (Reed's Crossing development). Community surveys to select a name for the school are already underway (see information below). A community process to determine the attendance boundaries for the school is expected to begin in late 2022 or early 2023. The school feeds into South Meadows Middle School and Hillsboro High School.

Groner K-8 Gym Seismic Renovations Completed

Last summer, the bond enabled renovations to overhaul the 73-year-old school building to "safe exit" seismic standards and freshen it up with new paint and other finishes. An upgraded vestibule was added to the front entry, along with other security measures.

However, when the existing gym was stripped open as part of the seismic renovations there, the bond team, seismic engineer and contractor determined that additional fixes were needed to provide more structural support for the roof before completing the remaining work. The staff was exercising an abundance of caution to ensure the safety of students and staff and increase the strength and longevity of the structure.

The gym had to be closed for several months during the 2021-22 school year. The cafeteria also had been off-limits during the renovations because of scaffolding placed to support the ceiling and the heavy equipment being used overhead in the gym. However, students were able to continue with PE and activities in a rented, temporary structure at the back of the building, underlaid with synthetic turf, and ate their meals in their classrooms.

Now, three new steel beams provide structural support in place of the gym's original wood trusses. The new beams were installed via cutouts in the west gym wall, which presented an opportunity to create new windows to bring daylighting into the gym. Fresh paint also refreshes the gym, and acoustic panels, video projector and screen have been added. For those with disabilities, a new lift provides access to the stage. Decals with school branding and the grizzly mascot have been affixed to one of the walls and on the front beam. Basketball hoops and a climbing wall complete the space. The gym is like new again!

After the gym work was done, the cafeteria also was renovated with a new ceiling and fresh paint. On April 15, students and staff were able to return to the gym, while work in the cafeteria continues. The temporary gym is being dismantled and removed, after more than fulfilling its purpose. To the regret of many, it unfortunately could not remain as a permanent addition to the campus. The space will be refreshed as the original playing field. The Pathways Center centralizes career and college readiness resources in a convenient location and is open to all HSD students, with accessibility to public transportation, community partners, and business internships. 2022 PROJECTS

Unless otherwise noted, projects for 2022 will take place during the summer break, although many started, and will have already been completed, before then.

Administration CenterRenovations: Data Center, Entry Vestibule, Restroom

Renovations will take place in the data center, the heart of the District's network facilities, including a new uninterruptible power system and fire-rating of the room. Building upgrades also include the entry vestibule to provide added security and monitoring of visitors, as well as renovation of the main restroom.

Hare Field

Domestic Water Pipe Replacement

Aging plumbing will be replaced in Hare Field's team shower and restroom facilities.

Hillsboro High School Exterior Painting

Now that all the building renovations, parking lots, concrete sidewalks, and landscaping are complete, the final project at Hilhi is painting of the buildings to have the exteriors look as refreshed as the interiors.

Ladd Acres Elementary SchoolAsphalt Replacement

Deteriorating asphalt will be replaced to smooth out the surface in the basketball/play area at the back of the school.



Liberty High School Solar Array Canopy

Joining Liberty's new sustainable agriculture and design building on the north side of campus will be a solar photovoltaic array to provide additional opportunities in sustainability education. The structure will be 18 feet long and occupy 5,500 square feet. The solar panels will form the top of the canopy structure which will cover the open workspace below. Mechanical and electronic equipment will be housed in a 900 sq. ft. room that will enable students to monitor the photovoltaics and analyze

data from the solar power production. Work is expected to take place from summer to fall 2022. Keep track of the project at bit.ly/3BKeQRf.



McKinney Elementary School

Domestic Water Pipe Replacement

The main water line to the street and interior galvanized pipes will be replaced due to some deterioration that was detected and could not wait until the next bond program.

Mooberry Elementary School Lobby HVAC Terminal Unit

An HVAC unit was added to Mooberry's lobby terminus of the system, providing better air circulation in the area. Construction and ductwork took place over spring break.

North Plains Elementary School HVAC Unit Replacement

A faulty HVAC unit on North Plains' rooftop will be replaced to provide more efficient operation and circulation of the HVAC system.

Tobias Elementary SchoolBus Dropoff

A new bus dropoff will be constructed off of SW 209th Avenue to more safely separate bus traffic from other vehicular traffic coming in at the entrance of the school. This separation will not only better protect bus riders, but also help to relieve congestion at dropoff and pickup times.

Transportation Building

Upgrades and Improvements

The Walnut Street facility of the Transportation Department will undergo renovations that include replacement of aging HVAC equipment, bus lifts, garage doors, and roofing. Skylights also will bring natural daylighting into the building.

Witch Hazel Elementary School Roofing

Witch Hazel will be re-roofed to help maintain and refresh the building's protective barrier.

Fencing and GatesAtfalati Ridge Elementary School Soccer Net

In February, a new mesh net was added above a side of Atfalati Ridge's synthetic turf field to prevent balls from going over into the adjacent swale.

Century High School Softball Fence

A new fence was constructed in March to form the home run perimeter of Century's softball field. At press time, the foul ball poles were about to be installed.

Facilities Building Automated Entry Gate

For added security and to ensure that unauthorized vehicles do not park in the building's lot after hours, an automated entry gate will be installed that can be opened with an authorized staff access badge.

Minter Bridge Elementary School Security Gates, Trash Enclosure

Security gates were installed in February at the perimeter of the campus. A new, cinderblock enclosure was built in March to provide a safer storage area for trash and recycling bins; fencing will be added shortly to furtner enclose the bins and prevent children from going into the area.

Mooberry Elementary School Gate Fixes

In February, sharp spurs that poked out of the hardware on existing gates were smoothed out or covered to prevent injury.

Orenco Elementary School Security Fencing and Gates

Over spring break in March, new fencing was added to the west side of the playground to prevent children from running into the parking lot. Gates are currently being fabricated.

Oak Street Campus - East **Security Gates**

In March, posts were installed at the driveway entrances to the OSC-East building to prepare for the installation of new gates, currently in fabrication, that will go across the entrances to prevent unauthorized parking during nonschool hours.

Secure Entry Vestibules at Schools

Free Orchards, Imlay, Lincoln Street, Orenco, Patterson, Quatama,

Rosedale, and Witch Hazel Elementary Schools

These projects comprise the remaining entry vestibule upgrades, after projects at all other schools were finished as part of their earlier building renovations.



At Quatama, a new door was carved out of the building to create a new entry vestibule into the main office.

Updated entry vestibules provide an extra layer of security for District buildings, in addition to the cameras, secured doors, and other parts of the monitoring and security systems. Doors remain locked while video doorbells help office staff screen visitors before allowing entry during the school day. Card readers ensure that only staff with properly-authorized badges are able to enter the building at any time. Quatama's entry vestibule was completed earlier in January; the remaining seven schools will be completed over the summer.

Window Replacements Groner K-8, North Plains and West **Union Elementary Schools**

Single-paned windows will be replaced with more energy-efficient double-paned windows at these older schools. The windows provide insulating air spaces between the two glass panes. These air pockets help prevent the external air temperature from affecting interior temperature, keeping classrooms and offices more comfortable, minimizing HVAC needs, and reducing energy costs for the long term.

Window Glass Security Film All Schools

Work is underway to apply window glass security film at all of our schools, making the glass harder to penetrate and holding any shattered pieces in place. The film not only helps protect windows from impacts, but also prevents injury from dangerous shards of glass if the windows do break.

Film application was completed in January for schools in the Century and Liberty feeder groups, as well as at the Administration Center. Work will be completed by summer for schools in the Glencoe and Hilhi feeders, Oak Street Campus, and the Walnut Street Transportation facility.

THE BOND PROMISE

When the bond was presented to the community, the campaign provided a list of projects - the "bond promise" - that would be fulfilled with the \$408 million requested. This also included a "wish list" of projects to implement if additional funding became available.

Since the bond was approved by voters in November 2017, bond premiums, interest and state grants have stretched our available

funding to nearly \$510 million. Wise and early procurement also enabled the District to buy in advance of and mitigate the impacts of current cost escalations and supply chain constraints.

Where do we stand on the bond promise? To summarize, we can go

back to the original list as well as the wish list (in italics) to compare what has been completed or is currently in progress. These symbols indicate the current state of the items promised:

- **O**=to be completed in 2023

Prioritize Safety and Security

Safety and security upgrades at all schools

Security system upgrades, including secure entry vestibules, are complete at approximately 80 percent of campuses. Quatama's upgrades were recently completed in January, and the remaining vestibules will be implemented at seven elementary schools (Free Orchards, Imlay, Lincoln Street, Orenco, Patterson, Rosedale, and Witch Hazel) this summer.

Cameras on all school buses

Security cameras were installed on all school buses in summer 2018.

Seismic and roofing upgrades

Seismic retrofits were made at buildings that were constructed prior to 1997 to bring them up to modern "life safety/safe exit" structural performance standards. These upgrades were made in consultation with the District's structural engineering consultant and architects. Re-roofing also was conducted at 17 buildings to retrofit aging roofs. Witch Hazel's and the facilities building roofs will be upgraded this summer.

■ Playground upgrades

New playgrounds were installed at seven elementary schools that included rubberized tile landings, ADA-accessible enrichment activities, and an all-weather turf section.

Parent/bus drop-off improvements

Dropoffs and parking lots were upgraded at 12 schools. These not only improved traffic flow, but also provided safer passage of pedestrians and vehicles. A new bus dropoff will be constructed at Tobias this summer.

■ Upgrading of new gymnasiums to "immediate occupancy" seismic standard

Budget was added to the new gym projects to design them to the higher "immediate occupancy" structural code. This enables the gyms to serve as community emergency shelters after a major seismic event.




Renovate and Repair Aging Schools

MYAC, plumbing and electrical upgrades

Along with seismic upgrades, building improvements at most schools included upgrades to mechanical and electrical components to replace aging equipment. This summer, an HVAC unit replacement at North Plains and domestic water pipe replacement at McKinney will complete this work.

■ Significant remodeling at Hillsboro High and Reedville Elementary Schools

Extensive renovations revitalized these older schools with improvements that included seismic, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, roofing



and other upgrades. Hilhi also enjoys a refurbished media center, commons, classrooms, front entry, and parking lots. At Reedville, the exterior historic character of the 1922 school remains while renovations modernized the building interior. A new modular building houses a larger cafeteria and several classrooms; a new playground topped it all off.

■ Replacement of 15 temporary portable classrooms in the poorest condition

 Replacement of additional portable classrooms with permanent structures

Temporary portables were replaced with permanent, modular buildings at Butternut Creek, Eastwood, Farmington View, W.L. Henry, Indian Hills, McKinney, Minter Bridge, Mooberry, and Reedville. These included not only new classroom spaces, but also restrooms so students no longer need to travel to the main building.

■ Installation of lighted turf fields at Century, Glencoe, and Hillsboro High Schools

Synthetic turf fields with lights provide all-weather and night-time use for school PE, athletics and activities, as well as community recreation.

® Replacement of pavement, sidewalks, other hardscapes

As dropoffs and parking lots are renovated at many schools, additional hardscaping also takes place where practical to increase safety as well as smooth travel along the campuses.

® Replacement of single pane windows

Farmington View's windows were replaced as part of last summer's building renovations. Windows will be replaced this summer at Groner, North Plains and West Union.

■ Replacement/resurfacing of tennis courts

In 2020-21, existing tennis courts were resurfaced at Century and Hilhi, and Glencoe's courts were removed from their original location and replaced adjacent to the locker rooms as part of its student parking lot renovations.



Relieve Crowded Classrooms,

■ Construction of separate gymnasiums at elementary schools that currently share gym and cafeteria space

Eight gyms were built, starting with Eastwood and Mooberry in 2019; W.L. Henry, Ladd Acres, McKinney, and Minter Bridge in 2020; and concluding with North Plains and Jackson in 2021. These schools can now hold PE and activities in a dedicated space apart from meal services. Youth basketball and volleyball leagues also utilize the much-needed facilities.

■ Expansion of Evergreen Middle School and Glencoe High School

Starting in 2019 and finishing in 2020, new wings were added to Evergreen and Glencoe comprising media centers and classrooms. These expansions, as well as other building renovations, provide additional capacity for existing programs and enrollment growth at these schools.

O Construction of one new elementary school in North Plains, one new elementary school in South Hillsboro, and replacement of Brookwood Elementary School

Two down, one to go! The new Brookwood replaced the existing school in 2020, and Atfalati Ridge was added in 2021 in North Plains. ES29 is currently under construction in South Hillsboro, opening in fall 2023.

■ Satellite transportation/maintenance facility

The new building for transportation and support services started construction in 2019 and was finished a year later. This facility houses the north hub for bus routing and maintenance as well as the District's construction trade and landscape maintenance operations. Classrooms also are available for career-technical education in diesel mechanic and construction trades.



Provide a Modern Education for Every Student

O Student and teacher technology

The aim of this promise was to ensure uniform application of technology throughout our schools, regardless of the age of the building, and to provide strong infrastructure to support technology needs. This included student Chromebook carts and teacher computers, as well as mounted HDMI projectors, projection whiteboards/screens, document cameras, and voice amplification systems in the classrooms. Wireless access points also were installed in classrooms for reliable connectivity. Bond technology purchases will conclude with completion of ES29 in 2023.


■ Expansion of career-technical education (CTE) spaces at all high schools

Every high school, with additional funding provided by state CTE grants, experienced major renovations to expand and improve classrooms and other facilities for career-technical education programs such as business and marketing; culinary arts; computer technology/design; engineering; and more. This included: expansion of Hilhi's automotive technology workspace, addition of new buildings for Century's early childhood education and Liberty's sustainable agriculture/design programs; and expansion of Glencoe's

construction trades into the old weight room and addition of health science classrooms and labs in its new wing. These expansions provide our students with modern facilities and equipment to further their education and move forward with future career goals.

O Flexible classroom furniture

With the ability to conform to a variety of configurations, flexible furniture is a major component of the classroom, providing a comfortable, relaxing and safe environment that helps keep students engaged in learning. Furniture selections and heights enable age-appropriate configurations. Bond furniture installations will conclude with ES29.





Wise Use of Taxpayer Dollars

O Installation of a fiber optic ring around the District, allowing Internet self-sufficiency and additional bandwidth

From February 2019 through August 2020, all 44 existing buildings were connected to the District's internal, dark-fiber ring, installed in partnership with the City of Hillsboro's HiLight fiber network. Atfalati Ridge was connected on its completion in 2021. ES29 will be connected before it opens in August 2023.

■ Purchase of land for future school sites

As neighborhoods continue to add new developments, the District has been proactive about its land use planning and real estate purchases for future new school sites. In addition to the ES29 site, the District owns other parcels in the South Hillsboro area, with plans to build a new feeder group there that might include two to three other elementary schools, a middle school and high school, depending on configurations of the sites. Of course, this depends on passage of a future capital bond as well as how real estate and potential student population develop in the area several years from now.

Proposed Measure 34-311: Local Option Levy Renewal

The May 17 ballot will contain proposed Measure 34-311 that, if passed, would renew the current operating local option levy to maintain police, fire, and parks services in Hillsboro. Voters authorized the current local option tax levy of \$1.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value in 2017. The current levy expires in June 2023.

Hillsboro's local option levy was first authorized by voters in 1998. The proposed levy would continue the current rate of \$1.72 per \$1,000 of assessed value for five years, starting in July 2023. If passed, the majority of the proposed levy funding would go to police, fire, and emergency medical services. The remaining amount of the proposed levy would be used for parks maintenance services.
